### **Expanding to Change More Lives**

What started as sketches on the back of a napkin three years ago has become a reality. Our major construction project is underway and includes a remodel of our 2,200 square foot Claire R. Jacobson Learning Center, the construction of a 3,200 square foot Training Center focusing on dog training classes and consultations for the public, and our new 3,100 square foot Sally Lucas TLC Center for dogs who need special attention prior to adoption.

The project will also provide adequate space for our dedicated staff, some who have been working in a leased modular unit for years, and a home for our vital Pet Food Bank.

We began conceptual design work in 2019, then paused while the entire world navigated a global pandemic. Several dozen generous supporters – including the SPCA's entire board of directors – buoyed our enthusiasm and enabled us to reach the finish line.

This is what our leaders and benefactors envisioned when our property was donated to the SPCA in the mid 1960s. Led by the Countess of Kinnoull, they gave us an extraordinary home expecting it would enable us to meet future needs. Your steadfast support is making our expansive dreams a reality.

All SPCA programs and services will continue during construction, estimated at 13 months. Look for construction progress photos on our website and social media!

### Thank You For Giving Animals Shelter From the Storm

Around midnight on Friday, March 10, as the tiny community of Pajaro was sleeping, the Pajaro River breached the levee. As the sun rose on Saturday, revealing muddy water as high as four feet, you were there to help — through your generous support of SPCA Monterey County.

Over the coming weeks, we sheltered 244 evacuated pets. Our disaster response team waded through water and sticky mud to rescue hundreds more and reunite them with their families.

Many residents evacuated with their pets. Others were unable to locate their outdoor cat or catch their chickens. Some thought the evacuation would last a day or two, and left food and water for their pets, expecting to return soon. As the days turned into weeks, they needed help.

"We were so desperate and we were losing hope. The SPCA gave us hope," said Isabel, whose elderly Aunt Linda lived alone with her two pets, a 15-year-old blind dog and an older parrot. SPCA rescuers saved the two pets who were hungry but safe, and reunited them with Linda.

Your donations provided the care animals and people needed. With the help of highwater rescue vehicles from the National Guard and the Monterey County Sheriff's Office, the SPCA disaster response team helped all types of animals in need: we saved dogs, cats, chickens, pet birds, fish, a rabbit, an iguana and a chinchilla.

### You Gave a Neglected Dog the Love He Deserves

During the cold and drenching winter storms, Enoch was either abandoned or somehow broke free with a thick chain embedded deeply around his neck. A Good Samaritan found the emaciated gray pitbull and rushed him to the SPCA, where your support saved him from a lifetime of neglect.

"The tight, heavy chain cut into his skin all the way around his neck over a centimeter deep, causing swelling and a serious infection," says Dr. Kate Riley, SPCA Veterinarian. "He was in significant pain and yet so loving and trusting. He just wanted to be with us."

SPCA veterinarians performed emergency surgery to clean, treat and suture gaping wounds ranging from 3 to 5 centimeters wide.

Enoch also has ears cropped almost all the way to his skull. He was emaciated, approximately 13-18 pounds underweight, and had pressure sores on his legs. He was very dirty and

covered in fleas. A soothing, warm bath removed fleas, caked-on mud, and feces.

"This poor dog was suffering, and had been in pain for quite some time," says Jacob Duarte, SPCA Humane Investigations Supervisor. "Thanks to our community's support, he is now safe and will never be hurt again."

Following emergency surgery, SPCA staff provided soft bedding, nutritious food and snuggles to help him heal. We also shared his story on social media, where adopters Harrison and Isela saw his photo and fell in love.

Enoch now spends his days playing and snuggling with his new family. He is a little league mascot and loves being around children. Isela's daughter is autistic, and has blossomed with him in the house. When she is upset, Enoch puts his head on her lap to distract her and calm her down.

"The SPCA gives all animals a second chance," says Isela." "They also give people a second chance by giving us the opportunity to adopt. We can't imagine life without him now."
